Methodology

- Open interviews with Mexican entrepreneurs, MSU Extension, and other individuals involved in providing training to Mexican Growers.

Needs:

 Disconnect between the programs offered and the particular needs of Latino growers in Michigan.

 Lack or limited access to credit and educational/technical knowledge.

Lack of grower organization.



Needs:

- Lack or limited knowledge of the commercialization process.
- Lack or limited knowledge of pest management practices.

 Reliance on aerial commercial pesticide applicator firms.

 Lack or limited knowledge of pesticide and labor laws.

Opportunities:

Opportunity to seek long term funding.

 Propose changes to the way credit is provided.

 Organize growers in co-op and or association.



Opportunities:

• Opportunity for pest management services.

 Opportunity for agricultural inputs.

 Opportunity for packaging/storage/distribution service.







Conclusion

 Mexican growers are forming an important group of entrepreneurs in Southwest Michigan.

 Rely mainly on "paisano" family networks to obtain information.

 Census data indicates that Latinos will become increasingly important to Michigan's agricultural industry in the years to come.

Conclusion (continued)

 It is essential that educational institutions and agencies pay attention to the needs of Mexican growers.

• Helping growers to integrate successfully into the industry will be beneficial for the growers, the agricultural industry, and the State's economy.
