"What's next for farm labor?"

Agriculture is akin to the canary in the coal mine when examining responses to the slowdown in unauthorized Mexico-US migration. About 70 percent of US crop workers were born in Mexico, and 70 percent of these Mexican-born workers are unauthorized, making half of all non-H-2A crop workers unauthorized. Unauthorized crop workers are aging, settling in one place with US-born children, and less willing to migrate. This prompts farmers to adjust to the slowdown in unauthorized newcomers by aiming to satisfy current workers to retain them, stretch workers with mechanical aids that increase their productivity, substitute machines for workers or switch to less labor-intensive crops, and **supplement** current workers with H-2A guest workers.
